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## Chairman's Statement

Unity ... Quality ... Access

t my nomination hearing. I spoke of a "lasting and developing partnership" on behalf of the arts between the federal government and the state and local governments. I have watched very closely over many years and with great delight the steady growth and maturation of the state agencies since I first had the opportunity to draft the language that established the basis for a partnership, in the legislation we began preparing in the Senate in the early 1960s. Today, the state governments are providing close to \$70 million to support the arts through their state agencies, compared with \$4 million in the early days of the Endowment.

Our relations—those of the Endowment and the states-throughout that period have sometimes had more valleys than peaks. . . . But now we are beginning a new chapter to develop a newly-constituted Federal-State Program carefully worked out with you over many months. I look forward so much to a program aimed at strengthening our partnership, and at sharing the decision-making process. . . . That, and the recommendation of NASAA, prompted me to establish a special committee of the National Council on the Arts to work directly with the state leadership on our goals and on the problems we face together in reaching them.

In our search for unity, we are exploring new possibilities for cooperation with state, community, and neighborhood arts groups. Just a week ago, a meeting was held in Washington with representatives of the national associations of community and neighborhood arts organizations. The

discussion was frank and, as it usually is in the arts world, passionate. At times it might have appeared that the simultaneously occurring negotiations at Camp David were easier. But agreement finally emerged on a steering committee or task force to put together over the next six months a program that would bring us all into better harmony and would assign responsible roles for all concerned.

The quest for unity has led us into new initiatives with other federal agencies that do have, or should have, programs that involve the arts. Take the newly proposed "Livable Cities" program in the Department of Housing and Urban Development, for example. We know from our past programs that the arts can galvanize a community, that they can provide a sudden surge of electricity, a symbol of communal pride or ethnic identity that can make the difference between success or failure of a community or neighborhood rehabilitation project. We also know that community revitalization is not, strictly speaking, our primary business. It's not that we don't care. We care deeply. But with the resources we have and are likely to have, we can't minister properly to the needs of the arts, let alone the wider needs of the city or its neighborhoods. In short, it's an instance where the problem is beyond our power to solve but not beyond our ability to provide intelligent help.

So we worked very hard on legislation to establish HUD's "Livable Cities" program. I personally did a lot of ambulance chasing, of putting out fires, of re-cementing coalitions to help achieve what was, after all, a relatively miniscule \$5 million

speck on the elephant-sized \$10 billion HUD budget. That small speck is really a seed, however-one that can take root and become a permanent part of the development of our cities. It is also the first acknowledgment in law of the fact that the Endowment's consultative role with another federal agency is to be of value. It sets, I believe, a major and important precedent.

Understanding is the first step toward unity, and unity is a message I have tried to convey in my travels to arts constituencies around the country and in meetings with arts groups at the Endowment. It is a message I hope will not be misunderstood. By unity, I do not mean uniformity, which is the death of art. I mean a unified expression of priority for the arts. Unless we "get our act together"-as artists, administrators, patrons, and appreciators —we will fail by a long distance to fulfill our potential strength-and it is immense if it is accomplished by unity.

Among the first actions I took on becoming Chairman of the Endowment was to remove the ceilings on grants in all the programs, leaving the matter in the hands of the program panels. The test all applicants for Endowment support must meet thus becomes the test of quality. If a project of extraordinary merit is in need of funding, is it reasonable to dilute quality as a standard by imposing an arbitrary limit on support?

Because the judgment of quality is so difficult, and doubly so in the arts, as you know, we rely on our panels of acknowledged experts in the field for basic review of applications and for guidance in policy. The panel system is at the center of the Endowment's operations, and that is why I decided early on that we should take an in-depth look at the way our panels are functioning. Under the direction of Mary Ann Tighe, Deputy Chairman for Programs, a lengthy study of the Endowment's panel operations is nearing completion. Thus far, the study has found, among other things, that the quality of decisions by the panels is being threatened by the mounting application workload; that too many applicants have not been viewed by panelists; that some panels have become unwieldy; and that there is confusion in the minds of some panelists about their duties and responsibilities.

The study recommended specific changes in panel structure and operations which we are in the process of assessing and then effectuating. Most of these are of a technical nature, yet they should have a major impact on improving the quality and fairness of decision-making by the panels. In the coming year we are committed to making every effort to get panelists and consultants to make on-site visits to all applicants. Judgments must not be made in the dark or based solely on hearsay.

Now, somewhere in the past ten months, I recall reading an article that suggested I was given to spreading jam too thinly on my toast, or something to that effect. I think I understand what the writer was trying to say: namely that federal funds for the arts are too limited to be spread very far without being wasted. Actually, I preferred what Congressman Clarence Long of Maryland once told me at a hearing. "I never met a farmer," said Long, "who didn't know that if you want to make the crops grow you've got to spread the fertilizer over the whole field and not just pile it in one corner."

What I've had great difficulty in accepting is a formulation that suggests an inverse ratio between quality and availability in the arts. I would think it is just the other way around. The more talented artists there are producing, the greater the likelihood that something of merit will be created. The larger the pool from which they are drawn, the greater the chance a superior talent will emerge.

In any event, we are engaged in a major effort to expand availability of the arts, and to begin by broadening access to the Endowment. That effort began by seeking and then winning—with the invaluable assistance of Mrs. Mondale-the largest

This was followed by a major reorganization of the Endowment under a management team of three deputy chairmen and myself. David Searles was named senior Deputy Chairman in charge of Policy and Planning, and later of general administration as well. The Endowment's growth had rendered the old management structure outmoded, creating potential bottlenecks in the steady flow of needed decisions. The new system is designed to make it easier to reach someone in authority at the Endowment. It still has a few kinks, but they are being ironed out. There is no question that it has enabled us to move more swiftly and with a greater sharing of new ideas.

Shortly after the reorganization, I announced a policy of rotation for senior program directors. There were those who insisted on going behind the scenes, or looking behind the arras as it were, to find some hidden motivation for the policy. But there was none.

I said at the time that I believe in a concept of renewal from the fields of the arts we serve. "We are a federal agency," I said. "We have immense responsibilities to keep the arts evolving. Perhaps of all areas of federal involvement, our agency is among the most sensitive, for we deal with freedom of expression, with qualities of imagination, awareness, and the evolution of new insights and perceptions."

Because of this, it seemed so very important that the leadership of the Endowment should not be static or based on concepts of irreplaceability. It, too, should be refreshed from time to time by change. The policy is that simple. It is not intended to reflect poorly on those who have served so well. It is a matter closely related to access. The rotation will be completed by the end of the year.

Accessibility is also the governing principle in a score or more of other changes at the Endowment. They include installation of a new computer, enlarging our capacity to store vital information and retrieve it quickly for applicants, grantees, panels, for state agencies, the National Council, Congress, and the public at large.

In the midst of this activity to improve the mechanics of our operation and thereby make the agency more accessible, we have not lost sight of some long overdue needs in the realm of uniquely American art forms. We are strengthening our jazz program at long last. And we have established a new program—Opera-Musical Theater—which will provide support for that art form which has a lasting luster in the history of American art.

I should point out as well that the activities of the National Council have also been reorganized to permit the Council to realize more fully its advisory and policy-making role. In addition to the special committee on Federal-State relations, I have appointed two standing committees on policy and planning and on the budget. As one Council member remarked, "We now have the kind of meetings where you don't know what the outcome will be until the meeting is over."

These remarks are excerpted from a speech delivered on September 15, 1978, at the annual meeting of the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies.

## The Agency and Its Functions

### The National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities

In 1965, Congress created the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities as an independent agency of the Executive Branch of the Federal Government. The Act, Public Law 89-209, was last amended by Public Law 94-462 in October 1976. The Foundation is composed of the National Endowment for the Arts, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and a coordinating council of federal officials called the Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities. The Foundation has no administrative or programming identity separate from its components. Each of the two Endowments is served by its respective advisory body, the National Council on the Arts or the National Council on the Humanities.

### Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities

The Federal Council on the Arts and the Humanities is composed of the chairmen of the two Endowments (the Arts and the Humanities), the Secretary of the Smithsonian Institution, the Director of the National Science Foundation, the Librarian of Congress, the Director of the National Gallery of Art, the Chairman of the Commission of Fine Arts, the Archivist of the United States, the Director of the National Park Service, the Director of the International Communication Agency, the Administrator of the General Services Administration, the executive secretary of the Senate Commission on Arts and Antiquities, and a member of the House of Representatives.

The Federal Council promotes coordination between the programs of the two Endowments and those of other federal agencies which support the arts and the humanities. It also undertakes research related to these programs. In 1978, President Carter reactivated the Federal Council after several years of dormancy and requested that it carry out a broad policy review of the cultural activities of the federal government. Joan Mondale serves as the Federal Council's honorary chairman.

#### The National Council on the Arts

Formed in 1964, the National Council on the Arts preceded by one year the establishment of the National Foundation on the Arts and the Humanities.

The Council is composed of the Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, who serves as Chairman of the Council, and 26 presidentially appointed citizens who are recognized for their knowledge of the arts, or for their expertise or profound interest in the arts. The Council is mandated by law to advise the Chairman on policies, programs, and procedures. It also must review and make recommendations on applications for grants.

#### The National Endowment for the Arts

The National Endowment for the Arts is, in effect, an independent federal agency, with its own Chairman, National Council, staff, programs, and budget.

Both legislatively and by Council policy, the Arts Endowment was conceived as a catalyst to increase opportunities for artists and to spur involvement in the arts on the part of private citizens, public and private organizations, and the states and communities. The Endowment's relationship to the primarily private and local cultural community is one of partnership, in which the federal role is to respond to the needs of the field rather than direct or interfere in the creative activities of individual artists or cultural organizations.

#### **Endowment Panels**

The panels serve the individual programs of the Endowment much as the National Council on the Arts serves the Endowment as a whole. Together the council and panels provide a system of professional peer review to evaluate applications, identify problems, and develop the policies and programs through which the Endowment responds to changing conditions.

Panels vary with each field. Usually they are composed of artists, arts administrators, board members, critics, and others who have a wide range of knowledge and experience in the field. Each panel reflects diverse geographic areas and a variety

of aesthetic and cultural viewpoints.

More than 500 private citizens serve on these panels, whose membership rotates regularly. Panelists are appointed by the chairman with the advice of the council and staff as well as other organizations and leaders in the field.

#### Program Areas

In fiscal year 1978, the Endowment had 13 major program areas. Eight programs correspond to individual art disciplines: Architecture, Planning, and Design (previously Architecture + Environmental Arts); Dance; Literature; Media Arts: Film/Radio/Television; Museums; Music; Theater; and Visual Arts. Five programs are interdisciplinary: Education, Expansion Arts, Federal-State Partnership, Folk Arts, and Special Projects.

#### Methods of Funding

Grant money authorized by Congress comes to the Endowment in three purses: program funds, the Treasury Fund, and Challenge Grant funds.

#### **Program Funds**

By law, not less than 20 percent of the Endowment's program funds must be allocated among state and regional arts agencies. The remainder is used for direct grants to organizations and individuals.

Endowment grants to organizations usually must be matched dollar-for-dollar by non-federal funds. When applying for grants, organizations must show evidence that they will meet at least half the cost of the project and must identify the sources of those matching funds.

#### **Treasury Fund**

When Congress created the Endowment, the legislation included a unique source of money called the Treasury Fund. This fund, maintained at the Treasury Department for the Endowment, in effect allows private citizens and organizations to share in the grant-making process.

To receive money from the Treasury Fund, an applicant must qualify for a grant under the guidelines of the appropriate Endowment program and must also secure a pledge from an outside donor to make a gift to the Endowment. This contribution, usually restricted for use by the designated grantee, frees an equal amount from the Treasury Fund to be given to the grantee.

Thus, when the Endowment awards a Treasury Fund grant, half the money has been contributed by a private donor and half has been appropriated by the federal government. This total then must be matched by the grantee. For example:

\$30,000—Donor's restricted gift to the Endowment

+\$30,000—Amount released from the Treasury Fund

\$60,000--Total Endowment grant

+\$60,000—Matching funds obtained by applicant from other sources

\$120,000—Total cost of project

The Endowment may accept gifts or bequests of money or property. Generally, these are tax deductible. To simplify procedures, donors do not have to send their gifts directly to the Endowment. Following approval of the grant, the grantee may receive the donation directly and report payment to the Endowment.

To apply for a Treasury Fund grant, an organization indicates on the application form obtained from the appropriate Endowment program that it is interested in Treasury Funds and lists in the budget request section the amounts and sources of income. The Endowment reviews the application in the same way it reviews any other grant application.

## The Year in Review



Fiscal 1978 was a year of transition for the Arts Endowment. In October 1977 (the first month of the new fiscal year), President Carter appointed Livingston Biddle chairman of the Endowment. Biddle replaced Nancy Hanks, who had served for the previous eight years. In his remarks at his Senate confirmation hearings, Biddle said:

"We find words like 'elitism' and 'populism' being used to support a polarization of the arts....

"I am convinced a very different approach is needed, a different means of defining our cultural goals. It seems to me that 'elitism' can indeed mean quality, can indeed mean 'the best'—that is a proper dictionary definition for the word. And 'populism' I would suggest can mean 'access.' Access to the arts all across the land.

"Why not bridge these two words . . . and simply say that together they can mean 'access to the best'? I believe that's what the arts and humanities legislation intended to convey from the very beginning—the encouragement of the best, the development of quality, and the availability of that quality to the greatest possible numbers of our people."

The year 1978 can be seen as an Endowment-wide effort to put these ideals into practice.

#### New Leadership

To his job as chairman, Biddle brought broad and appropriate experience. In the early 1960s as special assistant to Senator Claiborne Pell (D.-R.I.), Biddle drafted the legislation that set up the Arts and Humanities Endowments. In 1966-67 he helped Pell write the two Endowments' reauthorization bill, which increased their scope and funding. In 1976, as staff director of the Senate Subcommittee on Education, Arts, and Humanities, he drafted another reauthorization bill, again increasing federal support and establishing the Challenge Grant Program. Biddle also served in 1966-67 as deputy to the Endow-

ment's first chairman, Roger Stevens, and, in 1975, as director of the Endowment's congressional liaison office.

In January 1978 Biddle announced his choices for the three positions as deputy chairmen of the Endowment. They were:

P. David Searles, formerly the Endowment assistant chairman, in charge of policy and planning;

L. James Edgy, Jr., previously executive director of the Ohio Arts Council, responsible for intergovernmental activities;

Mary Ann Tighe, formerly arts adviser to Vice President and Mrs. Mondale, to oversee the Endowment's program offices, which support arts disciplines.

Biddle said that the three deputies (in place of the previous one) were needed because "the Endowment has reached a mature stage where it requires more management resources at the top to deal with the issues facing the arts community today." The new management team, he said, would "make the Endowment more flexible and responsive to new ideas."

Broad management changes continued in the next echelon as well. In April Biddle announced a rotation policy for program directors, suggesting five years as a "benchmark" for the appropriate term of service. In a memorandum to the staff. Biddle declared the change part of his plan "to make the Endowment as responsive as possible . . . to the changing and mounting needs of the arts and the growing demands on the Endowment. I believe in a concept of renewal from the fields of the arts we serve." A rotation policy, he pointed out, always has been in effect for the National Council on the Arts (sixyear terms) and Endowment advisory panels (generally three- or four-year terms). By the end of 1978, all Endowment program directors who had been in their positions five or more years had moved to other positions either within the Endowment or outside the agency.

By the end of 1978, two new program directors had joined the Endowment staff: Michael Pittas, associate professor and





deputy director of the Urban Design Program at Harvard's Graduate School of Design, became director of the Architecture, Planning, and Design Program. Tom Freudenheim, former director of the Baltimore Museum of Art, became director of the Museum Program. Two members of the Endowment staff were selected to head program areas: A. B. Spellman, former assistant director of the Expansion Arts Program, became director of that Program. James Ireland, acting director of the Opera-Musical Theater Program since its creation in July, was named the new Program's director.

Other new program directors (who joined the staff in 1979) include: Arthur Ballet, professor of theater at the University of Minnesota, director of the Theater Program; Ezra Laderman, composer and former professor of composition at the State University of New York, Binghamton, director of the Music Program; David Wilk, poet and former editor of Truck magazine and publisher of Truck Press in St. Paul, Minnesota, director of the Literature Program; and Esther Novak, former director of Rutgers University's Hispanic Arts Program, director of the Special Projects Office.

#### New Ventures

#### **New Programs**

Opera-Musical Theater: At its May meeting, the National Council on the Arts recommended that a new program be created to support both opera and musical theater. First proposed by the opera section of the Music Program in September 1976, the Opera-Musical Theater Program took shape at a series of meetings that brought together luminaries from the field.

Although opera and musical theater often are viewed in this country as distinct art forms, the Council's discussion soon led to the recognition that each field faces similar problems: lack of adequate funding for these complicated and expensive art forms, loss of creative personnel to television and movies, and little opportunity to "try out" or develop new works.

Addressing these mutual problems and exchanging ideas can bring new insights and more creativity into the field. As Deputy Chairman Mary Ann Tighe said, "One important function of the Endowment is to be a catalyst, bringing people together to inspire one another. This kind of interaction occurred when the opera and musical theater world met here."


A newly formed panel, representing both opera and musical theater, accepted the following policy statement as a guide for the development of programs:

"The National Endowment for the Arts, through its Opera-Musical Theater Program, is committed to broadening the concept of music theater and to making this art form available to an expanding audience.

"Whether comic or serious, earthy or elevated, music theater, from the time it moved from the courts to the public arena over two centuries ago, has been part of a tradition of people's art at its best. It has flourished most when it has been an integral part of the fabric of public life. The Opera-Musical Theater Program hopes to eliminate the barriers which separate the various forms of music theater, and to help create an atmosphere of mutual respect and appreciation.

"Funding both the traditional and the innovative, the Program seeks to raise artistic standards, strengthen the administrative and financial stability of organizations, and stimulate employment for American artists and artisans. The Program emphasizes the creation, development, and production of new American works, as well as experimentation with new forms and techniques."

Although there will be no substantial funding for the musical theater component of the new program until at least fiscal 1980, a few pilot grants were made in 1979. Musical theater productions usually are mounted as profit-making ventures, which the Endowment does not fund. Ideas for assistance have centered on the nonprofit sector, including musical theater productions by opera companies









and regional theaters, and experimental workshops that help develop both new works and collaboration among composers, librettists, performers, choreographers, and directors.

Folk Arts: The Endowment has had a Folk Arts Division as part of the Special Projects Office since 1974. In fiscal 1978 the National Council on the Arts created a separate Folk Arts Program. The new Program supports organizations and groups that sponsor or assist traditional arts: those arts, according to the guidelines, "that have grown through time within the many groups that make up any nation-groups that identify themselves as sharing the same ethnic heritage, language, occupation, religion, or geographic area." Folk Arts embraces music, dance, song, poetry, tales, oratory, crafts, and rituals. The folk music section of the Music Program was transferred into the new Program during the year.

The Program will fund the same kinds of projects it has supported in past years -presentations of traditional arts and artists, documentation of traditional arts, services to the field, and apprenticeships. The Program expects to remain flexible and invites "inventive and imaginative proposals."

#### **Grant Categories**

In 1978 several Programs set up new grant categories to serve the various disciplines.

New Music Performance: The Music Program established a category to support organizations that perform or present 20th century music. The category is designed to encourage the performance of new music, increase audience awareness of contemporary music, and give American composers more opportunities to have their works performed. The first grants, ranging from \$5,000 to \$25,000, will be

awarded for the 1979-80 performance season.

City Arts: The Expansion Arts Program launched a pilot category to increase its effectiveness in inner-city neighborhoods. Selected city governments and city-designated arts councils were invited to apply for funds for technical assistance programs or sub-grants for developing neighborhood programs. Stimulated by City Arts grants, local funding is expected to grow enough in three years to support these projects without federal money.


Professional Theater Touring: The Theater Program already supports touring through grants to the state arts agencies. The new category makes other sponsoring networks, such as consortia of colleges or universities, eligible for Endowment support.


#### New Federal-State Partnership


In August the National Council on the Arts approved a major revision in the way the Federal-State Partnership Program works with state arts agencies.

The law that established the Endowment requires that 20 percent of the Endowment's congressional appropriations go to the states and that three quarters of this portion be divided among the states in basic grants. (In 1978 these "basic state agency grants" amounted to \$243,000 per state.)

The changes affect the method by which the remaining quarter of the Fed-State budget will be allotted. In the past, grants had been awarded on a competitive, project-by-project basis to state arts agencies and to regional arts organizations. States now will receive funding on the basis of their total state plan and a funding formula that takes account of a state's need (based on population) and effort (based on the state legislature's arts appropria-







tion factored by the state's per capita income).

In addition, the Program's guidelines draw a distinction between Fed-State funding and that of all other Endowment Programs: "While the Arts Endowment is ultimately responsible to Congress to examine state arts agencies activities and to recommend whether or not to grant federal funds, our primary goal is not to withhold funds, but to work with the states and assist them in utilizing those funds effectively."

#### Revised Panel Structure

By 1978 the number of applications for grants had grown to nearly 20,000. "It was clear that the tremendous increase in applications since the Endowment began had severely strained the existing panel structure," says Deputy Chairman Mary Ann Tighe, under whose direction a full-scale study of the panel system began.

The study called for a better division of labor, not only to distribute the workload, but to accommodate the conflicting demands made on the system: more time for policy discussion without jeopardizing the quality of application review; more people involved in the panel process without impairing efficiency or disrupting program stability.

Recognizing that panel needs were different in the different programs, the panel study made some general recommendations, which then were adapted to the requirements of individual fields. Generally, the study recommended that panel responsibilities in each program be divided between a policy panel and a number of grant panels, with linkage between them. The responsibilities of grant panelists would be limited to application review

and specific policy recommendations arising from that process. In most cases, grant panelists would prepare for and attend only one meeting a year. Each member of the policy panel (which would meet at least once a year to review and revise program guidelines, and advise on policy matters) would also be active on at least one grant panel, whose recommendations he or she would bring to the policy panel.

Panel restructuring has been in progress since the beginning of 1979, and is being studied to see if further modifications are needed.

#### Joint Enterprises

Livable Cities: A new Endowment partnership was created when Congress authorized a Livable Cities program to be
administered by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) in
cooperation with the Arts Endowment.
The new program seeks to use the arts
as a tool for neighborhood revitalization;
it marks the first time the Endowment
has been legislatively joined to another
federal agency in a cooperative endeavor
(although the Endowment has worked
with other agencies under interagency
arrangements not established in law).

Livable Cities was originally proposed to Congress in late May as part of President Carter's urban policy. Under this program, nonprofit groups, particularly on the neighborhood level, will be encouraged to apply to HUD if their projects: (1) have "substantial artistic, cultural, historical, or design merit"; and (2) represent community initiatives having "a significant potential for conserving or revitalizing communities or neighborhoods, and for enhancing community or neighborhood identity and pride."





Congress authorized \$5 million to be administered by HUD for Livable Cities in fiscal 1979 and \$10 million in fiscal 1980. HUD and the Endowment jointly will draft guidelines, select experts to judge the projects, and select the projects to be funded.

International Activities: In 1978 the Arts Endowment, in partnership with other federal agencies, expanded its international activities.

The Endowment and its panels will advise the International Communication Agency (ICA) on international cultural exhibitions and events. In a memorandum of understanding, the White House outlines how the cooperative venture works. ICA-which was created in 1977 by merging the State Department's Bureau of Cultural Affairs, the United States Information Agency, and the Voice of Americawill present the Endowment chairmen with "comprehensive lists of overseas opportunities for art exhibitions, performing arts events, speakers, and other types of cultural activities." ICA also will submit a list of organizations, artists, and scholars interested in traveling or in sending works abroad. The Endowments' advisory panels will then review the lists and select and rank final choices. Final decisions on specific exchange activities and participants will rest with the director of the ICA.

The Endowments will also provide ICA with lists of their grantees and cultural activities around the United States and will welcome ICA staff and foreign cultural officials to panel and Council meetings. As a result, ICA will be continuously posted on arts events in this country. "If, for example, we support an art exhibit in Chicago," said Deputy Chairman Mary Ann Tighe, "the ICA will be able to determine, before it is too late, if it wants to send the exhibition overseas. By marrying our programs-ICA tells us what it needs, the Endowment tells ICA what we know —we should improve the quality of international cultural exchange."

In their first major joint venture, the Arts Endowment and the Humanities Endowment in October presented Mexico Today, a month-long symposium. Featuring concerts, poetry readings, films, panel discussions, dance performances, exhibitions of arts and photography, Mexico Today drew over 450,000 people to 44 events in nine American cities. In addition to the Endowments, the symposium was sponsored by Meridian House International, the Smithsonian Resident Associate Program, and the Center for Inter-American Relations.

#### **Extending the Boundaries**

#### **Minorities**

In August the National Council on the Arts reaffirmed its commitment to the Endowment's Expansion Arts Program and to its priorities. The Program's basic role, as described in a policy paper presented to the Council, is "to extend the boundaries of the arts world and to assure that no American will be denied the opportunity to reach his or her artistic potential because of geographic, economic, or other social or cultural restraints." As then-assistant director A. B. Spellman put it: "The Expansion Arts Program is geared to low and moderate income groups and to people living in rural communities, towns, and inner city neighborhoods. We want to ensure that the arts delivered to them are of high quality."

The Program's policy paper went on to outline its future agenda: to solidify assistance to emerging institutions, to encourage its grantees in training professional artists, to extend more administrative aid to its grantees, and to strengthen the interchange between Expansion Arts and the discipline programs of the Endowment.

In an effort to broaden minority participation in the arts, Biddle established within the Office of the Chairman a minorities office in September 1978, naming Gordon Braithwaite, previously head of Special Projects, special assistant for minority affairs. In this post, Braithwaite works with the chairman, the deputies, and all the Endowment's programs, acting as liaison between the agency and minority groups and individuals.

Among the Endowment's goals for minorities, Biddle said, are these: "to bring







arts groups, as they qualify, from the Expansion Arts Program into those Endowment programs which more directly serve their artistic needs and encourage their continued development, such as Dance, Theater, or Music . . . and to strengthen those ethnic cultural institutions of proven excellence so they can attain financial independence and stability."

Biddle also pledged more technical assistance for developing arts groups and greater minority representation on regular Endowment program panels.

In the spring and summer of 1978 Endowment leaders and representatives of black groups (the congressional Black Caucus and the National Ad Hoc Committee on African-American Contributions to the Arts) held a series of meetings concerning the number of Endowment grants to blacks.

Exactly how much Endowment funding currently goes to minority arts groups? As Biddle explained: "It was difficult at first to determine the number of minority grants because our application forms do not identify applicants in this way." However, an internal Endowment study by the Policy Development Division found that in 1977 minority organizations, individuals, and projects received at least \$8.9 million. (In 1978 the total had risen to \$10.8 million, a 40.1 percent increase over 1976.)\*

#### Special Constituencies

At its November meeting, the National Council on the Arts broadened the Arts Endowment's efforts to reach special constituencies: handicapped children and adults, the aging, and those institutionalized in hospitals, nursing homes, or prisons.

The action reaffirmed an earlier Council resolution (1973) which states that "the arts are a right, not a privilege, and no citizen should be deprived of the beauty and insight into human experience that only the arts can impart." The Council called for pilot programs showing how the arts can reach special constituencies. The Council's new resolution also requests that the Endowment "work closely with all its grantees to implement Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973" and that Endowment programs "review their guidelines to encourage grantees to support activities for special constituencies."


In the Federal Register of April 13, 1978, the Endowment published draft regulations that would prohibit discrimination against the handicapped by Endowment grantees and contractors. The rules are the first step toward implementing Section 504 of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act, which requires that "no otherwise qualified handicapped individual in the United States . . . shall, solely by reason of his or her handicap, be excluded from participating in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance."

The draft rules (final regulations were scheduled to become effective in April 1979) were written by a 20-member task force that included artists, arts administrators, consultants, representatives from the Endowment's major programs, and representatives from such service organizations as the National Assembly of State Arts Agencies.

The regulations require equal access for

<sup>\*(</sup>The study's definition of "minority" includes black, Hispanic, native American, multi-ethnic, Polynesian, Oriental, and Caucasian ethnic folk groups. Grants to "mainstream" institutions that employ minorities or put on events geared to minority audiences were not counted, nor were block grants to states. In such states as New Mexico, for example, a sizable portion of the money goes to Hispanic projects. The study also revealed that in 1977 the percentage of minorities on Endowment panels was 14 percent. By mid-1979 the percentage of minorities on panels has nearly doubled.







the handicapped to programs and equal opportunity for jobs in federally supported programs. The regulations define as handicapped "any person who has a physical or mental impairment that substantially limits one or more major life activities, has a record of such impairment, or is regarded as having such impairment." The regulations will apply to all Endowment grantees -state and local governments and arts organizations that receive funding directly or indirectly.

Planning for the Future

During the year various groups met to discuss the Endowment's policies. Task forces studied specific problems and recommended steps to resolve them. Committees worked to chart directions for the future. Among the studies with the greatest potential for affecting the Endowment's future are these:

Task Force Reports

Education, Training, and Development of Professional Artists and Arts Educators: The task force was formed in August 1977 when then-chairman Nancy Hanks, concerned that no systematic review of the Endowment's role in artists' training existed, named Council members Willard Boyd, president of the University of Iowa, and Martina Arroyo, opera singer, cochairmen of a 30-member committee to study the problem. At five public meetings around the country between October 1977 and June 1978, the task force heard more than 70 presentations, commissioned papers from experts in various fields, and met with arts students. Its final report was endorsed, in two separate resolutions, by the National Council on the Arts in December 1978.

Primarily, the report emphasizes that the National Endowment for the Arts has a vital interest in the identification, training, career entry, and development of artists.

Among the report's recommendations: The emphasis for federal assistance should be aid for the individual artists and arts teachers in training and careers.

- The Arts Endowment should increase its fellowships, internships, apprenticeships. and residencies for beginning artists.
- · The Office of Education bears the major responsibility for arts education in the nation's schools, with cooperation and support from the Arts Endowment.
- · Grant applications from educational and training institutions should be judged on the basis of quality, not origin.
- · Research in the arts and arts education should be a concern of the federal government. Research is needed in such areas as the nature of learning in the arts and the processes for identifying and developing artistic talent.
- · The Endowment and the Office of Education should make a joint appointment of a senior staff member to coordinate arts education policy between the two agencies.

Hispanic American Arts: In November 1977 the National Council on the Arts established a 23-member task force to determine the needs of the Hispanic arts community in this country and to recommend ways to strengthen their arts. The task force, headed by Jacinto Quirarte, director of the Research Center for the Arts at the University of Texas, San Antonio, and comprised of Hispanics who are prominent in the arts, is scheduled to make its final report in August 1979. The task force has met as a body six times and has held open meetings around the country aimed at increasing communication between Endowment staff and Hispanic artists. It also has sent out questionnaires to gather information on the extent and variety of Hispanic arts.

Thus far, the primary concerns of the task force have been:

- · To see that Hispanics are adequately represented on both the Endowment's staff and its panels.
- To ensure that Hispanic artists and arts groups receive fair consideration from all the Endowment's programs.
- · To educate the Endowment and other agencies about the special nature of Hispanic arts.
- · To plan a symposium on the "Hispanic-







American Aesthetic: Its Origin, Manifestations, and Meaning," to be held in April 1979.

 To strengthen Hispanic arts organizations through increased technical and administrative assistance.

Community Program Policy: In December 1978, the Endowment's Office of Intergovernmental Affairs assembled the Task Force on Community Program Policy, a 14-member panel whose job is to:

- Examine the relationships among the Endowment, state arts agencies, and local arts agencies and organizations.
- Clarify the basic differences in function and scope among local arts agencies.
- Recommend an overall policy for the Endowment's relationship with local arts agencies.
- Recommend to the Endowment programs consistent with the new community arts policy.

The task force is led by Eduardo Garcia, a playwright and former executive director of the Monmouth County Arts Council in New Jersey. Since December, the task force has met once a month; in addition, its members have sought advice from the field in nine public meetings around the country. The task force will deliver its final report to the National Council on the Arts in August 1979.

#### Council Committees

Members of the National Council on the Arts became deeply involved in policy-making during 1978 through work in smaller committees established for the first time. A new Budget Committee, under the chairmanship of William Eels, was formed. A new Policy and Planning Committee, under Chairman J. C. Dickinson, worked closely with the Endowment's new Policy Development Division to outline goals and directions for the future. A full five-year plan is scheduled for presentation to Congress in 1979. A preliminary statement, drawn up by the committee and approved by the Council,

captures the vision of the Endowment's future shared by the leadership within the agency and by the National Council on the Arts:

#### Statement of Goals and Policies

#### Preamble

This statement of the goal of the National Endowment for the Arts, its role and responsibilities in the artistic life of the nation, is rooted in certain fundamental convictions.

These include the belief that there is a response to the world which may be termed aesthetic awareness, a distinctive perception of the aesthetic dimension of our physical and social environment.

This perception is unique to humankind and has existed as a fundamental part of all human societies from the earliest times. It is through the various arts that this perception of the world is sharpened, enlivened, expressed, and developed as a celebration of life in all its forms.


Cultivation of this awareness is a societal good as it quickens the experience of life and enhances its quality. Thus, the condition of the arts is an appropriate concern of the people, and hence a proper concern of government. In recognition of this fact, the National Endowment for the Arts was created.


It is not the intention of this statement to define "art." The term is to be understood in its broadest sense; that is, with full cognizance of the pluralistic nature of the arts in America, with a deliberate decision to disclaim any endorsement of an "official" art, and with a full commitment to artistic freedom.

#### Statement of Purpose

The goal of the Endowment is the fostering of professional excellence of the arts in America, to nurture and sustain them, and equally to help create a climate in which they may flourish so they may be experienced and enjoyed by the widest possible public.







#### **Policies**

Individual Creativity and Excellence: To foster creative effort by individual artists:

(a) through support for individuals, including noninstitutional ensembles, of high artistic talent and demonstrated commitment to their field within the arts;

(b) through support of training and development of individual artists.

Institutional Creativity and Excellence: To foster creative effort and the development of excellence in the arts in America:

- (a) through support of institutions for projects and productions of substantial artistic significance, originality, and imagination:
- (b) through development of staff resources and through support of service organizations that provide technical and informational assistance to artists and institutions for the pursuit and achievement of standards of professional excellence in the arts.

The Living Heritage: To preserve the artistic birthright of present and future generations of Americans by supporting survival of the best of all art forms which reflect the American heritage in its full range of cultural and ethnic diversity.

Making the Arts Available: To insure that all Americans have a true opportunity to make an informed, an educated choice to have the arts of high quality touch their lives so that no person is deprived of access to the arts by reason of:

- (a) geography
- (b) inadequate income

- (c) inadequate education
- (d) physical or mental handicaps
- (e) social or cultural patterns unresponsive to diverse ethnic group needs.

Leadership in the Arts: With responsiveness to the needs of the field, to provide leadership on behalf of the arts:

- (a) through advocacy and cooperation with other governmental agencies on all matters relating to the arts;
- (b) through advocacy with private institutions to stimulate increasing support for the arts from the private sector;
- (c) through exploration of effective ways in which the arts may be used to achieve desirable social ends;
- (d) through enlargement of the public's knowledge, understanding, and appreciation of the arts.

Implementation: In carrying out these policies, reliance on the tested principle of review by peer panels is critical. To draw upon the judgment and experience of individual artists and other professionals in the arts-particularly those on the National Council, its committees, and the Endowment panels—is essential to establishing policies and making informed decisions in support of the arts.

The principle that financial support from the Endowment be matched by non-federal monies is also central to the manner in which these policies are carried out. While strongly affirming the value of the matching principle, the Endowment should give careful attention to the needs of developing arts groups of special merit which may not be able initially to adhere fully to the matching principle but are otherwise deemed worthy of support.

Although the second round will be paid out of fiscal year 1979 funds the grantees were chosen by the National Council on the Arts in August 1978. 


